Dear Sue:

You've surely decided that I had forgotten our conversation at the airport. I'm grateful to you for finally getting me on the ball on this family history business: I've been promising my brother's children to do it for 7 or 8 years now. So I've finally brought it up to date, and done the copying.

About the arms & crest. I'm also inclosing a copy of the Halbert's "Historiography" which I sent for as a result of an ad some years ago, just to see what they had come up with, and how valid it was. You will note in studying my presentation and theirs, that there is a bit of disagreement. My source was an heraldry volume that looked about a hundred years old, which I found along with several others at the Louisville Public Library when I was stationed at Fort Knox in '65-'67. The arms definition & description is verbatim and confirmed from two sources, and without license, poetic or otherwise. In my color rendition, the elk's head should be brown (proper meaning natural color), but I seem to be out of brown pencils!

Note that Halbert's shows the mullets (some call them "estooiles) as pierced, but they do not let the base shield color come through. The number of droplets is, as far as I know, optional, so you can have the chevron splattered with as many as your artistic eye wishes. Halberts also makes an error in that they improperly interpret the term "crescent of the last." Webster's Unabridged states that the heraldic "crescent" has it's points upward, and usually has reference to a "second son." But the description specified that the crescent should of "of the last" (quarter), which puts the points to the right, just as it specifies that the mullets (stars, estoiles) are of six points, because by definition, a mullet has five points unless you are told otherwise. You will find most of these definitions in Webster's Unabridged (the LARGE book of short stories), as well as in the older (100-200 years) heraldic registry books*. Halbert's also doesn't give the crescent's "chief" it's full third of the shield, and keep the mullets out of the chief. I think that the mullets in my drawing could have been a bit larger from an artistic point of view. Lastly, I'm not sure whether the helmet and plumes are appropriate or not. The sources that I worked from didn't show them. I do remember that you don't get "supports" in the form of rampant lions, elks, persons, etc., until you get into the "Lord" class (baronets, barons, earls, dukes etc); "supports" meaning the figures flanking the shield and 'holding' it. I suspect that the helmet and plumes only goes to a member of the family who has been knighted, but I'm not sure. One of these days I'll look it up.

I'm also not very good at drawing elk's (or any other animal's) heads.

(*) Preferably those printed in the British Isles, not in the U.S.A.

Unhappily, my brother Ken has absolutely no interest in family history. Our Aunt Helen, who was a simply grand lady and my favorite relative, never could quite understand this - I can't either!

CRUTTENDEN

Family from Kent, England. The name Cruttenden believed to have derived from old or ancient English meaning "Valley of the Little Crooked River."

CREST: Az. a chev or. guttee de poix between three mullets of six points pierced argent, in chief a crescent of the last. Crest an olks head proper.

Definitions.

Azure: blue.

Or: gold.

Gutee de Poix: sprinkled with pitch (drops) of sable or black.

Mullets: stars, normally of five points. Also called "estooiles."


Pierced: meaning a circlet in center showing the base color of the shield.

Argent: silver. (Ar.)

In Chief: at the top third. ~~by quarter~~

Crescent of the last: The moon in its last quarter, i.e., the points to the right. Crescents normally are with points up, unless otherwise noted.

Proper: represented in natural color.




The Guilford, CT records show all "Cruttendens". Apparently once the New York and upper Connecticut River valley generations left Connecticut, they changed the "U" to an "I". In England, it seems to be Crittenden also, in most cases. I like Crittenden better, anyhow.

CRUTTENDEN (CRITTENDEN)

Family from Kent, England. One branch immigrated to Virginia in the Norfolk area in 1609, and apparently founded the town of Crittenden, which is now only a post office address. The last of the line in Crittenden, Virginia was Katie Crittenden Atkinson, who was in her 40's in 1942. The northern branch of the family originated from Kent also, when the first Samuel Crittenden came from England with his wife and children in 1639, settling in Guilford Connecticut.

ARMS: Az. a chev or guttee de poix between three mullets of six points pierced ar., in chief a crescent of the last.

CREST: An elks head proper.



Coat of Arms



Historiography

The Crittenden Coat of Arms illustrated left was drawn by an heraldic artist from information officially recorded in ancient heraldic archives. Documentation for the Crittenden Coat of Arms design can be found in Bolton's *American Armory*. Heraldic artists of old developed their own unique language to describe an "Individual" Coat of Arms. In their language, the Arms (shield) is as follows:

"Azure a chevron or goutte de poix between three estoiles of six points pierced azure in chief a crescent of the last."

When translated the Arms description is:

"Blue, a gold chevron with black droplets between three blue stars

Above the shield and helmet is the Crest which is described as:

"An elk's head proper."

A translation of the Crest description is:

"An elk's head in natural color."

Family mottoes are believed to have originated as battle cries in medieval times. A Motto was not recorded with the Crittenden Coat of Arms.

Individual surnames originated for the purpose of more specific identification. The four primary sources for second names were: occupation, location, father's name and personal characteristics. The surname Crittenden appears to be "locational" in origin, and is believed to be associated with the English, meaning, "one who came from, or lived near Criddon." The supplementary sheet included with this report is designed to give you more information to further your understanding of the origin of names. Different spellings of the same original surname are a common occurrence. Dictionaries of surnames indicate probable spelling variations. The most prominent variations of Crittenden are Crittenton, Crittenton, Crittenon, Criddon and Crittendens.

Census records available disclose the fact there are approximately 1225 heads of households in the United States with the old and distinguished Crittenden name. The United States Census Bureau estimates there are approximately 3.2 persons per household in America today which yields an approximate total of 3920 people in the United States carrying the Crittenden name. Although the figure seems relatively low, it does not signify the many important contributions that individuals bearing the Crittenden name have made to history.

No genealogical representation is intended or implied by this report and it does not represent individual lineage or your family tree.
