The observance of the 128th anniversary of the birth of George Q. Cannon finds his numerous posterity met again to honor his memory, to renew their bonds of love and affection, and to review the events of the past twelve months.

In the main, the year seems to have been a good one. Births within the family have been numerous, and deaths few. There have been many noteworthy honors and accomplishments, and generally speaking the family appears to have enjoyed a full measure of health, happiness and prosperity.

Another of the first generation left the family circle when Brigham Telle Cannon passed away last Nov. 9, in his eighty-first year. Genial, witty, and held in fond affection by all the family, Uncle Brig had been a faithful participant in these reunions and his absence will be

Daniel Hoagland Cannon died last April 1 after being struck by a car, on the night he was to have retired from his work, after passing his 65th birthday. 

NOTES ON GEORGE Q. CANNON'S ACTIVITIES A CENTURY AGO

On Nov. 29, 1854, George Q. Cannon returned from a four-year mission to the Sandwich Islands (Hawaii). A few days later, Dec. 10, 1854, he married Elizabeth Hoagland in Salt Lake City. On May 10, 1855 he departed for San Francisco, Calif., where he began work on the publication of the Book of Mormon in the Hawaiian language. By Dec. 31, 1855 he had completed the printing.
