Today we have been "taking in" Chicago. If you could have seen our party I am sure you would have been amused. They cannot see how anyone can live in Chicago. I understand their feelings exactly for although I have never felt exactly the same, I have felt that it would be a great trial for me to live in these large cities. We visited the Fair grounds & were well repaid for our trouble. Having obtained special permission we saw the whole arrangement, & indeed it is stupendous. One building, which is the largest, covers over 40 acres of ground, & all each are larger, or as large as the Tabernacle.

I have but a few minutes, & am writing this in a railway station, so I

cannot say much. I have thought of home many times, of course, but do not feel homesick, though my health is not good. I trust you will all pray for me, for I feel that I need it very much. Be sure & request father to do so, I feel that the Lord has blessed me on this trip, & I know it is His will that I should come.
