## Rites Sunday For Resident

Mrs. Louise Benson Parkinson, 69, widow of William C. Parkinson, died at 5:30 a.m., today at a local hospital from a cerebral hemorrhage.

Mrs. Parkinson was born March 28, 1869, in Logan, daughter of Bishop George T. Benson and Mrs. Benson. She lived in Logan until 1883 and then moved with her parents to Whitney, Ida., where she resided until 1909. She then returned to Logan where she lived until she moved to Salt Lake City in 1931.

She married William C. Parkinson in February, 1887. Ten children were born to the couple, eight of whom still survive.
