Dear Brother:

I am just in receipt of your favor of May 19th and am off to attend conference in Bristol. I thought you had all particulars you now ask for. It will be allright for you to take the trip you speak of. I think Elder Walker is the man for the hour, so you had better turn over affairs to him before you leave for home, unless we get some word from the First Presidency. Now, about transportation. The Megantic which sails on the 17th is a large, new boat, with all modern improvement s, and will most likely carry a company of our people, taking not more than eight days to Montreal. The Celtic for New York will leave June 18th and the Dedric June 25th. The Arabic will leave June 11th for New York. The extra charge on the liners would be #11. £2-4-0 each adult for the Celtic and Cedric, and £1-4-0 on the Arabic. From New York to Chicago by way of Washington will cost you \$2.95 each adult and the same amount from Chicago to Salt Lake, because you will not be with a company. We cannot send your wife on a missionary rate because of orders from headquarters and trouble that has been caused over it in times past. Now, let me explain that a new route has been arranged from Montreal by Rutland R.R. to Albany which will take our people to Buffalo, thence to Niagara Falls. This route will not take you to Washington, but you would save materially in funds by traveling that way and be on as

good a boat as one of the New York liners. Again, if separated from the company at Chicago, your wife would have to pay \$11.15 extra and you \$2.95. Now let us know what you want and we will arrange accordingly. If you can meet your folks at Chicago, it will save all complications. If it is a matter of dollars and cents, you had better go by the Megantic on the route here mentioned, leaving out Washington and New York and taking in Niagara Falls, without extra expense, on sea or land.

Sister Penrose joins me in love to you and your family, and hoping that Sister C. received the package of malted milk safe.

A good trip to you and safe return for a start for home. In haste.
