

# Cannon At 71 in Apartment

Winnifred S. Cannon, widow of Sylvester Q. Cannon, former presiding bishop and member of the Council of Twelve, Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, died Saturday at her apartment on South State St.

Death was attributed to a cerebral embolus. Mrs. Cannon had been in ill health for several years.

Oct. 6, 1880, in Salt Lake City, she was a daughter of George and Elizabeth Saville. She was married to Mr. Cannon in Salt Lake Temple June 14. She was a life-long member of Salt Lake City and spent three years during her husband's time in the Netherlands for the Church. Elder Cannon died in 1943.

She is survived by seven sons and daughters: Julian S., and D. Cannon, and Mrs. Elinor Robinson and Mrs. Lucile C. Cannon, all of Salt Lake City; Mildred Q. Cannon and Mrs. C. O'Connor of Los Angeles, California, and Dr. Lawrence S. Cannon, Berkeley, California, also 25 grandchildren.

## Friends, Family, Gospel Cited at Cannon Rites

"Friends, family and gospel" were three fundamental factors influencing the life of Mrs. Winnifred Saville Cannon, whose funeral services were conducted Tuesday at 12:15 p.m.

According to Stephen L. Richards, first counselor in the First Presidency of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, who made the statement during the services, Mrs. Cannon was a person who was blessed with many friends, a wonderful family, and a good knowledge of the gospel.

### Personal Nature

His message was of an extremely personal nature, for, as he pointed out, his family and that of Mrs. Cannon had been closely associated through the years, and there was a large circle of close friends who were known to each.

Richard L. Evans, member of the First Council of Seventy of the LDS Church, also spoke at the services in the Thirteenth LDS Ward Chapel.

"I know of no principle of Christian living she did not conform to to the best of her knowledge and ability," he said.

### Widow of Apostle

He mentioned her "wonderful, honest, able and faithful" family, pointing out that her seven chil-

dren were an "exceptional" group.

## Late Apostle's Widow, 71, Dies at Home

Mrs. Winnifred Saville Cannon, 71, 29 S. State, widow of Sylvester Quayle Cannon, died of a cerebral embolus at her residence Friday about 10 a.m.

A life-long resident of Salt Lake City, Mrs. Cannon served her church three years, 1907-10, with her husband, president of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints mission in Holland.

The late Mr. Cannon subsequently served 13 years as presiding bishop and for several years as a member of the Council of Twelve Apostles of the LDS Church.

Mrs. Cannon took an active part in the LDS Church and for many years was a Primary teacher in University Ward. She was a member of the Classics Club in Salt Lake City.

A daughter of James and Elizabeth Saville, she was born Oct. 6, 1880, in Salt Lake City.

She was married to Mr. Cannon June 15, 1904, in Salt Lake LDS Temple.

Surviving are four sons and three daughters: Mrs. Elinor C. Robinson, Mrs. Lucile C. Richards, and D. James and Julian S. Cannon, all of Salt Lake City; Winfield Q. Cannon and Mrs. Sylvia C. O'Connor, both of Los Angeles, and Dr. Lawrence S. Cannon, Berkeley, Cal. Also surviving are 25 grandchildren.

Funeral arrangements are pending arrival in Salt Lake City of her two sons who reside in California.
