UNIVERSALITY OF THE SPIRIT OF CHRIST*

ELDER SYLVESTER Q. CANNON PRESIDING BISHOP OF THE CHURCH

The spirit of Christmas should be the Spirit of Christ. If we remember His life and His labours, we appreciate the fact that there are two outstanding things in His life and labours that appeal to us. One is that which He taught and which He exemplified—that we should do good to others; and by that I mean to do good in every sense of the word, material and otherwise; and the other is that we should learn to walk in the way of eternal life, to keep the commandments of the Lord, and to live in harmony with the will of God. You remember that when the Saviour had completed His mission, after He had been resurrected from the dead, following His crucifixion, and after He had instructed His Apostles and others of those who had received authority from Him, that they with Him walked to Bethany and there He ascended into heaven and was lost to their sight. While they stood there, two angels appeared to them and said: "Ye men of Galilee, why stand ye gazing up into heaven? this same Jesus, which is taken up from you into heaven, shall so come in like manner as ye have seen him go into heaven."

Now referring again to the two things completed in the life and labours of the Saviour: Everyone of us can easily learn how to

do good to others as He has taught and shown, if we have in our hearts a desire to do so; but to learn and to live the way of eternal life, which is the Gospel of Jesus Christ, require teachers, that men may learn how to live. So the Apostle Paul, in one of His epistles, makes the following statement: "Whosoever shall call upon the name of the Lord shall be saved. How then shall they call on him in whom they have not believed? and how shall they believe in him of whom they have not heard? and how shall they hear without a preacher? And how shall they preach, except they be sent?"

AUTHORITY NECESSARY

So that it requires not only that there should be teachers or preachers to make known to men the way of life, but that they should also be sent, or authorized. After the Saviour had chosen His Apostles, and other officers of His Church, in the meridian of time. He said to them upon one occasion: "Ye have not chosen me, but I have chosen you, and ordained you, that ye should go and bring forth fruit." Again, the Apostle Paul, discussing the Priesthood, calls attention to the fact that men cannot select themselves to preach the Gospel and to administer in the ordinances, for he says: "No man taketh this honour unto himself, but he that is called of God, as was Aaron." Aaron, as you will remember, was called by one having authority, who had also already been authorized to act in the name of the Lord. We recognize Jesus Christ as not only the Saviour and Redeemer, but the Great High Priest of our profession, the One by whom we can come unto God, and gain salvation. We are told that the Priesthood of God, or the authority to act in His name, is "without father, without mother, without descent, having neither beginning of days, nor end of life."

If it is without beginning of days or end of life, it is eternal; it requires that there shall have been and always shall be intelligent beings to officiate in the Priesthood, because the Priesthood functions through those who receive it. Therefore, there must have been intelligent beings from the beginning. The Apostle Paul quotes the Psalmist David, wherein, speaking of the Saviour who was to come, he said: "Thou art a priest for ever after the order of Melchizedek" and again: "Called of God a high priest after the order of Melchizedek." In one of the revelations given to us in these days, as contained in the Pearl of Great Price. we are told that Abraham received promises from the Lord through the Priesthood, which should be enjoyed by his posterity in large measure. It reads: "I will bless them that bless thee, and curse them that curse thee; and in thee (that is, in thy Priesthood) and in thy seed (that is, thy Priesthood), for I give unto thee a promise that this right shall continue in thee, and in thy seed after thee . . . shall all the families of the earth he blessed

Anniversary Celebration Centers in Salt Lake Where Visitors Come From 33 Stakes of District

Traveling in pilgrimages from nearly every stake in the Church, thousands of young men and boys holding the Aaronic Priesthood today assembled about the various temples in Utah, Arizona and Canada, celebrating the restoration of that priesthood in modern times through the personal ministry of John the Baptist.

Each temple-at Salt Lake City, Logan, Manti, St. George, Utah; Mesa, Arizona, and in Alberta, Canada, was surrounded by boys coming from districts surrounding. and in groups ranging from 300 to more than three housand, the young men were given instruction in priesthood and temple work.

The largest group of all was that which assembled in Salt Lake for one of the most outstanding Aaronic priesthood programs ever held



With bared heads, and in small groups, the priests, teachers and deacons walked in single file to the grave, stood in reverent silence as the life story of the great Pioneer leader was retold by B. Spencer Young, Jr., and Ross Beattle.


Four Historic Sites

The boys were also taken on tours of the site of the Brigham Young sc. e, the Social Hah sitt, the Salt Lake the ater site, the Bee Hive house, the president's office, the house of the first governor of the territory, the Lion house and the Church Offic building.

Guides were under the direction of the Young Family association, and were headed by J. Don Carlos Young, son of Brigham Young, who was stationed in the old President's office between the Lion and Bee Hive houses. Other guides were Brigham S. Young, B. Spencer Young, Jr., Don C. Young, Jr., Tracy Y. Cannon, Orson Rega Card and others.

Groups continued to come steadily during the entire two hours. Then the boys were summoned to the front steps of the Church Office building, where Presidents Heber J. Grant and David O. McKay, Elders Reed Smoot and Joseph Fielding Smith of the Council of the Twelve, Bishop Cannon and Elder Giles greeted them.




