Elder Cannon has served as a member of the general authorities for eighteen years. In 1925 he became Presiding Bishop of the Church succeeding Charles W. Nibley who had been called into the First Presidency. In 1938 he was ordained an Apostle and became an associate of the Council of the Twelve. A year later he was named a member of the Council of the Twelve filling the vacancy occasioned by the death of Elder Melvin J. Ballard.

While on a mission to Holland and Belgium, Elder Cannon became president of that mission from 1900 to 1902. Two years after his return home (1904) he became a counselor in the presidency of the newly created Pioneer Stake, and while serving in this capacity he also presided over the Netherlands mission from 1907 to 1909.

A graduate of the University of al projects now underway in the Utah and the Massachusetts Institute of Technology he was an engineer by training and served in a number of engineering positions. From 1913 to 1925 he held the post of City Engineer where he supervised all engineering projects for the city, including water supply, water works, sewage, construction, paving, curb and gutter installation, sidewalks, smoke abatement, special lighting systems and he in-Gleaners of Los Angeles stake augurated the city zoning plan. He was formerly chairman of the board of trustees of the L. D. S. 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
